Ariel Ramirez (1921 - 2010)

Born in Santa Fé, Argentina, Ariel Ramírez specialized in the folklore of his native country and made extensive studies of its history and development. In 1950 he went to Europe to study the folklore of Central Europe at the Academy of Vienna. He received a fellowship to the institute of Hispanic Culture in Madrid where he studied the origins of Argentine music.

"Misa Criolla," widely regarded as a stunning artistic achievement, combined Spanish text with indigenous instruments and rhythms. Its effect is that of a reverent carnival, and it has sold millions of albums and been performed countless times across the world. For all its verve, "Misa Criolla" had its origins in a post-Holocaust visit to Germany. He felt a need to compose something deep and religious that would revere life and involve people beyond their creeds, race, color or origin, the composer told the Jerusalem Post. He added in another interview that the song was a tribute to human dignity, courage and freedom, with a distinct message of "Christian love."

"Navidad Nuestra" Like the "Misa Criolla", Ariel Ramírez composed "Navidad Nuestra" in 1964. For the six episodes of this Creole tableau with Spanish texts by Félix Luna (b.1925), the composer availed himself of dances and songs of Argentine musical traditions that are indicated in the score. From the characteristic melodic 6/8 rhythms in the dance types chamamé in La Anunciación and the chaya riojana in Los Pastores, to the gracious lyricism of the huella pampeana in La Peregrinación and the vidalas from Catamarca in El Nacimiento, Ramírez evokes a wide range of expressions from traditional Argentine music. Luna's six poems narrate the universally known episodes of the Christmas story from the annunciation through the birth to the flight to Egypt from Herod's sacrifice of children. Far from the original Bethlehem, Luna locates the story in the north of his native Argentina, alluding in particular to the moon of the Rioja in the poem about the adoration by the shepherds. The text, in Castilian, interpolates words in the indigenous guaraní language; in La Anunciación, for example, the Virgin Mary is described as la más bonita cuñatai (the most beautiful of all maids) and the angel Gabriel arrives caté which translates roughly as 'sharp-looking'. Other native elements in the text portray the country people to whom the work is dedicated. Telling examples are the offering by the Three Kings of a poncho blanco de alpaca real (a white poncho, the finest alpaca) and the references to local instruments such as the cajas, guitars and bombo leguero. As well, there are three references to drinks made from the algarrobo blanco tree – aloja (beer), añapa (a non-alcoholic beverage) and arrope (a thick, sweet syrup).

Conrad Susa (1935 to present)

Conrad Susa studied composition at Juilliard where he won a number of awards including a Ford Foundation Fellowship. His scores for theater, documentary films and television total more than one hundred and have been performed at major theaters and festivals, including the San Diego and Stratford Shakespeare festivals, the American Conservatory Theater, and the Guthrie Theater.

Carols and Lullabies — Christmas in the Southwest" — Carols and Lullabies came about when conductor Philip Brunelle suggested to Conrad Susa he write a companion piece to Benjamin Britten's "A Ceremony of Carols." Using a collection of Spanish carols he had sung as a boy in Arizona, Susa juggled them around to form a narrative. In it, Susa explores the Christ child's birth through the many moods, rhythms, and colors of Bethlehem carols that use varied texts — Biscayan, Catalonian, Puerto Rican, Spanish, Andalucian, Castilian, and Mexican. The evocative timbres of the harp, the marimba and vibraphone, and the guitar are woven into an instrumental fabric that is at times beautiful and serene and at other times rhythmically energetic.

CONDUCTOR



Pete Nowlen — has been a member of the UC Davis faculty since 1988, and the CSU Sacramento faculty since 1990. He was a member of the French horn section of the Sacramento Symphony from 1987 to 1996, and is active as an orchestral and chamber musician and conductor.

Horn performance credits include the San Francisco Symphony, Opera and Ballet orchestras, Symphony Silicon Valley, Sacramento Philharmonic and Opera, the Music in the Mountains Festival, and the International Orchestra of Italy. In 1992 he was the third prize winner of the

International Competition for Solo Horn of the Castle of Duino, Italy, and in 1994 was a semi-finalist in the prestigious American Horn Competition

Mr. Nowlen has been the Director of Concert Bands at U. C. Davis since 2002 and is Opera Musical Director at CSU Sacramento. Previous opera, ballet and theater conducting credits include La Boheme, Hansel und Gretel, Magic Flute, Amahl, Orpheus in the Underworld, La Finta Giardiniera, Billy the Kid, L'Histoire du Soldat, Façade, Little Shop of Horrors, Falsettos, Company, and Man of La Mancha.

Orchestral conducting credits include the Sacramento Symphony, UCD Symphony Orchestra, CSUS Symphony Orchestra, Camellia Symphony, and Music in the Mountains Orchestra. Major symphonic repertoire conducted includes Beethoven's Symphonies No. 3, 5, 6 and 9, Saint-Saens' Organ Symphony and Christmas Oratorio, Mozart's Requiem and Great Mass plus numerous symphonies and concerti, Copland's Appalachian Spring, Dvorak's Cello Concerto and late symphonies, Schumann's Piano Concerto and Rhenish Symphony, Mahler's Fourth Symphony and Songs of a Wayfarer, the Mussorgsky/Rimsky Pictures at an Exhibition, Prokofiev's Cinderella, Franck's Le Chausser Maudit and D Minor Symphony, Sibelius' Violin Concerto, Tchaikovsky's Fifth Symphony and Romeo and Juliet, and Schwantner's New Morning for the World.

FEATURED SOLOIST



Norman DeVol, Tenor, is an accomplished soloist from San Francisco Peninsula currently living in San Bruno. He received his B.A. in voice from San José State University where he studied with Jeanne Garson. Norman has performed with professional symphonies and opera companies throughout Northern California, including the Sacramento Symphony, Auburn Symphony, Apollo Opera, Camellia Symphony, Monterey Symphony, Opera La Piccola Scala, Mission City Opera, Pocket Opera, West Bay Opera and Berkeley Opera.

Reviewing a recent performance of Mozart's Die Zauberflöte, the Santa Clara WEEKLY called him "the vocal standout of the evening... His clear and flexible voice rang from beginning to end with strength, stability, and true artistry, as one hopes to hear in a heroic Tamino. One sensed the experience and knowledge behind every nuance, and true artistic respect for each famous note."

Norman's interpretation of Rodolpho in the Piccola Scala production of La Bohème garnered him a nomination for a Elly Award. When he's not singing, Norman also teaches voice privately, is a choral director and accompanist. He is currently the assistant conductor of the internationally acclaimed Masterworks Chorale based at the College of San Mateo and is a member of the San Francisco Opera Chorus.

BIOGRAPHIES

SOPRANOS

JEAN ALFORD has been singing in choirs all her life. Not unusual when your parents and grandparents were church choir directors in So. California for several decades. Besides her membership with Camerata California, Jean has also sung with the Sacramento Symphony Chorus, the Sacramento Choral Society, the Sacramento Opera Chorus and is a member of the women's vocal ensemble, Chanteuses. Jean currently sings with the Trinity Episcopal Cathedral Choir under choirmaster David Link.

AVA DELARA is a member and regular soloist with Camerata California. She has also been guest soloist with many regional California orchestras, including the Solano Symphony, Camellia Symphony, Auburn Symphony, Gold Country Chamber Orchestra, the Sacramento Choral Society Festival Symphony, and the Valley Choral Society Orchestra. Her oratorio work includes Rossini's Stabat Mater, Händel's Messiah, Haydn's Missa in Augustiis, Mozart's Vesperae Solennes de Dominica, a television broadcast of Verdi's "Messa da Requiem", Saint-Säen's Oratorio de Noël, and J.S. Bach's Magnificat and B Minor Mass.

In December 2007, Ava sang the Magnificat from Randall Thompson's The Nativity according to St. Luke. In 2009 she added Vaughn Williams' Dona Nobis Pacem to her repertoire and gave her first ever performance of Mahler's Symphony No. 4. 2011 provided her the opportunity to perform Resphigi's beautiful and difficult Lauda per la Nativita Del Signore.

Her opera experience includes performances of leading roles with several of California's regional opera companies, including Townsend Opera Players, North Bay Opera and the San Francisco Children's Opera. The roles she has performed include Violetta (La Traviata), Cio-cio-san (Madama Butterfly), Aida (Aida), Erste Dame (Die Zauberflöte), Georgetta (II Tabarro), Esmeralda (The Bartered Bride), Cinderella (Cinderella), Josephine (H.M.S. Pinafore), and Polly (The Beggar's Opera) which garnered her a nomination for a Sacramento regional theater Elly Award.

AMANDA JOHNSTON has performed with several different choral ensembles both nationally,

and internationally. In addition to singing with the Camerata California. She is currently singing with the Sacramento City College Choir.

VANESSA CAMILLE MARTUCCI was born and raised in Sacramento and began studying music at age 10. She began her music studies by taking piano lessons and performing in a local children's choir and drama group. In high school, she continued participating in choir, and had the opportunity to perform with the California Regional Honor Choir in 2006. She also played clarinet with a private high school band under the direction of Eric Rainwater. At age 16, she began studying voice with baritone opera singer Nicolai Mitakys, whom she studied under for 3 years. During that time she completed her Associates Degree in Communications at Sacramento City College. Upon transferring to Sacramento State University, Martucci decided to concentrate on music as well as Italian. BIOGRAPHIES

Mary is delighted to be singing with Camerata, after having taken several years hiatus from performing in preparation for retirement to Idaho.

MARY ANNE KIRCHNER was singing in the church choir in utero when her mother was doing just that in Louisville, Ky. She learned Gregorian Chant with block notes in the sixth grade and san daily Mass for three years in that format. In high school and college she sang alto in the chorus for those eight years. She also sang in Holy Name Choral Club, a regional chorus, doing solo work for community concerts. After graduation, she continued her church affiliation, taking charge of and leading the weekly congregational singing in Oklahoma. After a break for marriage and children, she came back to choral singing, leading the Alta California Regional Center Christmas choral group from 1984 until 1992 here in Sacramento. In 1984 and 1985 she directed the Madrigal Singers for Shakespeare in the Park at McKinley Park. She was the vocal director for a presentation of Jesus Christ, Superstar, produced by Sacramento City College in 1983. She was a founding member of a vocal trio, "Oh Yeah" which presented music of the 30s, 40s, and 50s, in the style of the Andrew Sisters until 1986. This group was featured for two years in the Community Showcase production. Since 2001, she has been singing alto in another vocal trio, "Hot Ticket", which also features music of the 30s, 40s, and 50s, in the style of the Andrew Sisters. A member of the Sacramento Opera Chorus, since 1991, she has appeared in over 30 operas.

BARBARA LAZAR is a life-long Sacramento resident. Barbara began in music as an instrumentalist. studying piano, trumpet, and organ. For some years, before computers took over the job, she worked both as a music copyist and transposer, transposing orchestra parts for the Music Circus.
