

Woven from the musical traditions of Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and England, this rich tapestry of choral and folk sounds includes Medieval, chant-based compositions, rollicking holiday songs, and the laments and ballads of a great people.

We're particularly excited about having authentic voices from Ireland and Scotland on the program—the beloved Celtic duo Men of Worth. To enhance our unique collaboration with James Keigher and Donnie Macdonald, we commissioned SMS composer-in-residence Clifford Shockney to create brand new choral arrangements of traditional Celtic carols and ballads.

You'll also be hearing new works by contemporary Dublin composer, Michael McGlynn. The choral group he founded, Anúna, has been at the forefront of the new wave of Irish music. The Master Singers have been enjoying his music so much, in fact, that we are planning a 2015 concert tour of Ireland that includes a workshop with Michael McGlynn. Our hope, as always, is to learn about World music from the best original sources, then bring that knowledge home to Sacramento audiences.

Sit back, now, as voices and instruments filled with Celtic spirit evoke the timeless beauty of green lands that are far away...and soothingly familiar.



Men of Worth

James Keigher, a native of County Mayo in Ireland, and Donnie Macdonald, raised on the remote Scottish isle of Lewis, have been charming Americans with stories and songs of their respective homelands since they joined forces in California in 1986. The duo drew their name from the song Men of Worth, by Scottish composer Archie Fisher. The ballad evokes the struggle of those whose souls are still tuned to the love of ancient traditions, but whose need for paying work draws them to modern industries far from home. Men of Worth have made the blending of tradition and modernity a hallmark of their intimate concerts, their educational programs for schoolchildren, and their personally guided tours of Ireland and Scotland. A lesser known aspect of World War I is the story of the unofficial 1914 truce between the British and German lines on the Western Front in order that both sides could observe Christmas. John McCutcheon, American composer, wrote this ballad to tell the story from the perspective of a fictional British soldier from Liverpool.

My name is Francis Tolliver. I come from Liverpool. Two years ago the war was waiting for me after school. To Belgium and to Flanders, to Germany to here, I fought for King and country I love dear.

It was Christmas in the trenches where the frost so bitter hung. The frozen fields of France were still, no Christmas songs were sung.

Our families back in England were toasting us that day, their brave and glorious sons so far away.

I was lyin' with my mess-mate on the cold and rocky ground when across the lines of battle came a most peculiar sound.

"Now listen up me boys," said I, each soldier strained to hear as one young German voice rang out so clear.

"He's singin' bloody well you know," my partner says to me. Soon one by one each German voice joined in in harmony.

The cannons rested silent. The gas clouds rolled no more as Christmas brought us rest from the war.

As soon as they were finished a reverent pause was spent. 'God rest ye merry gentlemen,' struck up some lads from Kent.

Next they sang was 'Stille Nacht." "Tis 'Silent Night," says I, and in two toungues one voice filled up that sky.

"There's someone coming towards us," the frontline sentry cried. All sights were fixed on one lone figure trudging from their side.

His peace flag, like a Christmas star, shone on that plain so bright as he bravely strode, unarmed, into the night.

Soon one by one on each side walked into no-mans-land with neither guns nor bayonet we met there hand to hand.

And we shared some secret brandy and wished each other well and in a flare-lit soccer game we gave them hell.

We traded chocolates and cigarettes and photographs from home, these sons and fathers far away from families of their own.

Young Sanders played the squeeze box and they had a violin, this curious and unlikely band of men.

Then daylight stole upon us and France was France once more. With sad farewells we each prepared to settle back to war.

But the memory haunted every heart that lived that wondrous night, "Whose family have I fixed within my sights?"

It's Christmas in the trenches where the frost so bitter hung. The frozen fields of France were warmed as Christmas songs were sung.

And the walls they'd kept between us to exact the work of war had been crumbled and were gone for ever more.

My name is Francis Tolliver. In Liverpool I dwell. Each Christmas comes. Since World War One I've learned it's lessons well.

That the ones who call the shots won't be among the dead and lame, and on each end of the rifle we're the same.

Bethlehem Down

PETER WARLOCK

"Peter Warlock" is a pseudonym which the Anglo-Welsh composer used in the latter part of his career. As a music critic he continued to use his own name; Philip Arnold Heseltine. Talented, he was also an unconventional and somewhat scandalous character, in 1927 Warlock wrote Bethlehem Down with poet Bruce Blunt to raise cash to finance their "immortal carouse" (a heavy drinking bout.) Definitely an odd background story for one of the favorite carols of the Anglican Church for Christmas and Epiphany!

"When He is King we will give Him the Kings' gifts: Myrrh for its sweetness, and gold for a crown, Beautiful robes," said the young girl to Joseph, Fair with her first-born on Bethlehem Down.

Bethlehem Down is full of the starlight: Winds for the spices, and stars for the gold, Mary for sleep, and for lullaby music Songs of a shepherd by Bethlehem fold.

When He is King they will clothe Him in grave-sheets:

Myrrh for embalming, and wood for a crown, He that lies now in the white arms of Mary, Sleeping so lightly on Bethlehem Down.

Here He has peace and a short while for dreaming: Close-huddled oxen to keep Him from cold, Mary for love, and for Iullaby music Songs of a shepherd by Bethlehem fold.

Born in Leicestershire in 1939, Andrew Carter has become one of England's most prolific choral composers. He wrote both the music and text for this quick, festive choral anthem.

In 1963, Sydney Carter wrote this hymn as an adaptation of the Shaker piece "Simple Gifts", and Carter's new work has, in the ensuing time, become quite popular. The setting goes beyond the typical carol material (that of the birth of Christ) and tells the tale of redemption in the ending of this dance.

I danced in the morning
When the world was begun,
And I danced in the moon
And the stars and the sun,
And I came down from heaven
And I danced on the earth,
At Bethlehem I had my birth.
Dance, then,wherever you may be,
I am the Lord of the Dance, said he,
