THE EDUCATION DIRECTOR

In harmony with STC's commitment to bring one Shakespeare piece alive each season, the STC School of the Arts has also made a commitment to introduce Shakespeare to elementary school audiences by bringing Lois Burdett's clever series of Shakespeare stories to STC's Youth Series season. This season we are doing *The Tempest for Kids*. Interwoven into the play, written in rhythming couplets, are select passages of Shakespeare's original text to introduce the original language to those students participating as actors and to our student audiences.

The Tempest for Kids plays May 8th -May 19th in the Pollock Stage and there is an overwhelming response from schools to see this play performed by students from STC's School of the Arts. Educators see the value of making Shakespeare's works accessible to their students. The themes and characters help us understand human nature. In Ken Ludwig's book, How To Teach Your Children Shakespeare, he states, "Shakespeare articulates emotions that help children understand the stresses of their daily lives" and "arts make a difference in how we see the world and how we conduct our lives – how we view charity to our neighbors and justice to our communities - and Shakespeare, has worlds to teach us as long as we have the tools we need to understand him."

THE DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR

A Midsummer Night's Dream has been adapted for the screen over 20 times in various renditions, as ballets from Balanchine to Elvis Costello, as dozens of concerts and even operas. It touches on themes of love, obviously, but also on loss of personal identity, ambiguous sexuality and even feminism. How fortunate are we to be able to present you a living piece of history from the 16th century? Shakespeare originally wrote this to entertain an aristocratic audience at a wedding. Audiences who were able to see it later did so as voyeurs into the aristocratic world. And we continue that tradition in 2019.

This is the true power of live theatre that STC works so hard to create for you. Presenting the feelings, attitudes and sentiments of days gone by to illuminate how far we have come as a society and yet, how far we have still to go.

The work of STC to present a variety of theatre to 50,000 Sacramentans each season, 15,000 of which are students often seeing theatre for the first time, is supported by the generosity of all of you. Please consider picking up a form in the lobby and donating to our scholarship programs for our School of the Arts, as well as to our family friendly

two professional productions. Join us for our Black & Red Gala on April 6th, Cruising Through the '70s and be sure to come back for our last two productions, *When We Were Colored: A Mother's Story* by Ginger Rutland and *Disaster!*, our 74th season finale, a comedy musical paying homage to the '70s disaster films.

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DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Welcome to the mischievous world of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Oberon and Titania, the king and queen of the fairies, begin the play in the midst of an epic feud. They are battling over a rare and precious child: an Indian Boy. Titania is the guardian of this child, but Oberon desperately wants the child to serve as his henchman. We know very little of the child, except that Titania says that his mother died during childbirth and left him in her custody. Oberon, however, disagrees and calls the child out as a changeling- a creature found in folklore who is believed to be a fairy child that has been left in place of a human child that was stolen by the fairies.

In our production we choose to explore the character of the Indian Boy even further. We have a young actor bringing this character to life. In the opening moments Titania's fairies sneak into a human child's bedroom and steal the sleeping child from their bed, transforming them into the Indian Boy before the audience's eyes. The next time the audience sees the child they have been immersed into "The Dream" with a new identity. Are they a changeling? Are they now doomed to the fate of the Indian Boy? Or will they somehow wake up and realize it was all a dream?

This production aims to highlight the transformative powers of love and the lengths to which we go to find and keep it. I welcome you to join us on this epic journey to see what fate has in store for our young changeling and the other characters in this epic exploration of love.

PLACE: ATHENS, AND A WOOD OUTSIDE OF ATHENS

In *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, residents of Athens mix with fairies from an enchanted forest, with comic results. Theseus, Duke of Athens, is to marry Hippolyta, queen of the Amazons. Bottom and his friends rehearse in the woods a play they hope to stage for the wedding celebrations.

Four young Athenians are in a romantic tangle. Lysander and Demetrius love Hermia; she loves Lysander and her friend Helena loves Demetrius. Hermia's father, Egeus, commands Hermia to marry Demetrius, or else she will be put to death. All four young Athenians end up in the woods, where Puck, who serves the fairy king Oberon, douses flower juice on the eyes of Lysander, and then Demetrius, causing both to love Helena. Oberon, who is quarreling with his queen, Titania, uses the flower juice on her eyes. She falls in love with Bottom, who now, thanks to Puck has been transformed, into an ass's head.

As the lovers sleep, Puck restores Lysander's love for Hermia, so that now each young woman is matched with the man she loves. Oberon disenchants Titania and removes Bottom's ass's head. The two young couples join the royal couple in getting married, and Bottom rejoins his friends to perform the play.
